2025-2026 Course Selection Information

As you select courses for the next school year, consider your strengths, interests, learning skills and work habits. Ensure that your selections meet graduation requirements, any post-secondary program prerequisites and your career and/or workplace goals.

It is important to consider your selections carefully as courses are scheduled according to the number of requests received for a course during the course selection process. Courses with fewer requests may be cancelled, and changes requested at a later date may not be possible.

It is also very important that you pick your alternate courses carefully as they may be used to create your timetable.

While the responsibility for your course selection resides with you and your parent(s)/guardian(s), please know that your Guidance counsellors and subject teachers are available to support you in developing your education plan.

Specialty Programs @ Aurora High School

Cooperative Education

Earn credits while gaining experience in the workplace in a half-day or full-day program.

Dual Credit

Earn up to 4 college and 4 high school credits while completing college courses.

French Immersion

Earn ten French Immersion credits (including a French Immersion language course in each grade) to complete an AHS French Immersion Certificate.

High Performance Athlete (HPA)

Accommodated schedule (mix of in-person and online courses) to allow flexibility while training and competing at a provincial, national or international level in a recognized sport.

Online [Asynchronous]

Online courses offered as part of a student's regular timetable—grade 11/12 courses only.

Ontario Youth Apprenticeship Program (OYAP)

Allows high school students to be registered as an apprentice and earn hours towards an apprenticeship through co-operative education.

Personalized Alternative Education (PAE)

Programming for students who do not find success in a traditional classroom setting and would benefit from smaller classes and an alternate learning environment.

Specialist High Skills Major (SHSM)

Programs available in Arts & Culture, Business, Construction, Health & Wellness, and Transportation that provide students with a sector-focused high school education, related workplace experience and a red seal on their diploma.

Student Services

Learning strategies classes, community classes, monitoring, and resource assistance for students identified through a formal Identification, Placement and Review Committee.

Course Selection Instructions

Course requests are submitted online using **My Pathway Planner**. You can use this program to select courses, explore post-secondary options, and develop a career plan.

How to access and select courses:

1. Log into [My Pathway Planner](#) using your GAPPS username and password.
2. Once you are logged in, you will be on your "Dashboard". Here, you can access the AHS course list, research post-secondary program options, set goals, and/or set up your portfolio. Your portfolio is where you can store information about the careers and post-secondary institutions you have researched, as well where you can highlight your skills and abilities.
3. To enter your course selections for the next school year, click on "High School" from the list of options on the left hand side of the screen.
 - To choose a **compulsory course** (grayed font) click on the  button. All of the courses in that discipline will appear.
 - To choose an **elective course** click on the  Course button. A drop-down menu will appear with all disciplines available in our school. Select the discipline you are interested in from the drop-down list or use the "Search Courses..." bar to search for the course. If you click on the course name or code, a description and the prerequisite(s) for the course will appear.

To add the course to your selections click the blue "Add Course" button. You will return to your course selection planner and the chosen course will appear.

Continue this process until you have selected all courses. **Be sure to select your elective courses in order of preference.**

 This symbol indicates a "Guidance Message" for you to read. Hover over the blue symbol and a note will appear.

To make changes to your course requests click on the  icon to change or edit your selection.

5. To review your course selection click on the  button at the top of the planner. Be sure to add an "Interested Pathway" and "Add Comment" for summer school, if applicable.
6. Submit your course selection by clicking the  button. Once submitted, **you can no longer make changes.**
7. You will be prompted to "Send Approval Email". Type in a parent/guardian email and click "Send". **Follow up with your parent/guardian to ensure they have approved your course requests.** Your course selection requests will not be received until the parent/guardian approval is completed.

Interested in Summer School?

If you are planning to take a compulsory course in the summer, you will need to replace that compulsory course with an elective course in next year's course requests. There are **several steps** for you to complete:

Part 1 (NOW): My Pathway Planner

- Click on the + sign next to the compulsory course you want take in summer school.
- A list of all the courses in the discipline will load. To pick an elective, change the discipline and click on the ▼ icon in the discipline box.
- Choose the discipline that your elective course falls under.
- From the list of courses displayed, pick the course you want to add to your course requests by clicking the "Add Course" button.
- You will notice the compulsory course has been replaced with your chosen elective.

Part 2 (NOW): Submit Courses and add a Summer School Comment

- Click on "Review Course Selections".
- On the Review Courses screen:
 - add an "Interested Pathway".
 - add a summer school note in the "Add Comments" textbox. Indicate the course code, course provider and delivery method **only** e.g.—ENG4U YRDSB online OR SBI4U EduTravel in-person.
- Add Parent/Guardian email address for approving your course requests and your summer school intention.

Please be aware that you have NOT registered for summer school at this time; you are only indicating your intentions to enroll at a later date.

Part 3 (LATER): Register in April/May


- You will need to log into My Pathway Planner and officially register for your YRDSB summer course in the spring. Guidance will email instructions to your GAPPS account once registration opens.

Notes from Guidance

Do you want to Opt-Out of the Online Learning Requirement?

1. Log into [My Pathway Planner](#).
2. Click on the + sign next to the Online Learning Opt-Out button.
3. Click on the Online Learning Opt-Out course button.
4. Review the Board's message, scroll down and click "Add Course".
5. You will notice an "Online Learning Opt-Out" course has been added to your planner.



Grade 12 students: do you want to have a spare next year?

- ✓ Leave an elective course box blank; this will indicate you wish to have a spare.

Grade 12 students NOT RETURNING to AHS next year:

- ✓ Click on the "Not Returning" icon in the top right hand corner, and select the reason and/or post-secondary plan.

34 Credit Threshold

Students may earn up to 34 credits in secondary school. Students may exceed 34 credits:

- if the credits are achieved within 4 years,
- if the student has an IEP, or
- if the student has taken ESL courses.

Going beyond the 34 credit threshold is possible with online, night school, and/or summer school courses. Please speak to a Guidance counsellor to discuss your plans.

Trades, College or University?

Apprenticeship, college and university programs provide varying credentials.

Apprenticeship programs include a combination of on-the-job training and classroom learning that leads to a trade credential. Once you receive your credential, you are qualified to work in a skilled trade.

College programs include a 1-year certificate, 2-year diploma, 3-year advanced diploma, 4-year degree, or 1-year post-graduate certificate.

University programs include a 3- or 4-year degree, 5- or 6-year professional degree, or post-graduate degree (Master's/Doctorate).


