Land Acknowledgement







Student Success Support

- For students struggling with school for a variety of reasons, including academic and social/emotional concerns
- Individual support and guidance with teacher and child & youth worker
- On-going monitoring and tracking
- Use of the Ravens' Roost as an alternative place to work
- Credit rescue and credit recovery





Student Services Support

Approximately 33% of our students have an IEP

Students identified with an exceptionality who have an IEP can receive the following supports:

- Learning Strategies classes (GLE101)
- Monitoring/in-class resourcing
- Accommodations
- Use of the testing centre
- Transition planning to post-secondary education, work and/or community living
- Community classes including: ASD, Autism, Comprehensive, Intensive and Multiple Exceptionality
 - Students are regionally placed into these programs



Programs for Multi-Language Learners

- Students new to Canada may need help to develop the level of proficiency in English required for success at school
- English as a Second Language (ESL) courses are offered from Level A – E










High Performance Athlete (HPA)

- Allows students who compete at the provincial, national, or international level in a particular sport to earn cooperative education credits through their training
- Available to students in Grades 10-12

(Grade 9 students are eligible if training occurs during the school day)







Specialist High Skills Major

- Programs in:
 - Business
 - Construction
 - Health & Wellness
 - Information &

Communications Technology

- Combines in-school courses with certifications, experiential learning, and community involvement
- Opportunities for students in Grades
 11 and 12 for ALL pathways











Co-operative Education

- Allows interested students the opportunity to earn credits through experiential learning in a workplace setting
- Offered as a half-day (2 credit) or full-day (4 credit) program
- Examples include OYAP (Ontario Youth Apprenticeship Program), militia co-op, summer co-op
- Available to students in grades 11 and 12





Dual Credit

- Allows interested students the opportunity to attend college while still in high school
- The cost of tuition, transportation, and books are covered by the government
- Students will earn both a college credit and an associated high school credit
- Available to students in grades 11 and 12
- Sample courses: Introduction to Psychology



NEW Technology Education Credit Requirement

Ministry of Education News Release - March 10, 2023

Starting with students entering Grade 9 in September 2024, all students will now be required to earn a Grade 9 or 10 Technological Education credit as part of their Ontario Secondary School Diploma.

NEW STEM Credit Requirement

In order to graduate, you must complete **1** from the following:

- business studies
- computer studies
- cooperative education
- mathematics (in addition to the 3 compulsory credits currently required)
- science (in addition to the 2 compulsory credits currently required)
- technological education (in addition to the 1 compulsory credit required)







Online Learning Graduation Requirement

- began with students that entered Grade 9 in 2020 2021
- students must earn at least two online learning credits to get their Ontario Secondary School Diploma.

Opting Out

- may be requested by completing the opt-out form (once enrolled in high school)
- opt-out option is available as a part of course selection for grades 10-12





Provincial Literacy Requirement

- Administered in the grade 10 year
- A test based on language and communication (reading and writing) expectations of curricula up to and including Grade 9
- If a student does not pass the first attempt:
 - Mulock will provide remedial support; the test will be re-administered

and/or

 the student can successfully complete the Grade 12 Literacy course (OLC)





Community Involvement

- Encourages civic responsibility, promotes community values and reinforces importance of volunteerism
- Student's responsibility to have activities pre-approved and submit verification upon completion
- Guidelines and forms are provided
- A great way to explore career interests
- Students may begin hours after Grade 8 graduation

Course Selection

In order to meet graduation diploma requirements, it is recommended that students take the following 6 subjects in Grade 9:

- 1. English
- 2. Mathematics
- 3. Science
- 4. Geography
- 5. French
- 6. Health & Physical Education





Elective Course Selection

Students must choose 2 elective credits from the following:

- Drama
- Music Instrumental &/or Vocal &/or Repertoire
- Visual Arts
- Business Building the Entrepreneurial Mindset
- Exploring Family Studies
- Learning Strategies (with or without an IEP)
- Exploring Computer Technology
- Technology and the Skilled Trades

Note: If a student chooses not to take a Tech course in Grade 9, they must take one in Grade 10





School Bus Information


- Only students in our community classes (Autism, ASD, Comprehensive, Intensive, and Multiple Exceptionality) are eligible for bussing

Transfer Policy

- Students who live outside the boundaries of the school they wish to attend must submit a transfer form to their current YRDSB school by the end of January
- Mulock is open to transfers for 2025-2026





Follow Up After Tonight

If your child:

- 1. attends one of our elementary partner schools
 - registration and course selection information distributed end of January
 - visits to Mulock end of January
 - transfer form needed if home address is outside of our catchment area
 - choose courses through
- PATHWAY Planner
- 2. attends another YRDSB school
 - registration and course selection information distributed by the home secondary school
 - transfer form needed if home address is outside of our catchment area
 - re-mapped to Mulock and can choose courses through PATHY
- 3. attends a non-YRDSB school
 - complete the Mulock Google Form (QR code in your package)
 - individual registration appointments early March
 - choose courses at the registration appointment



Who Do We Support?

- Students already identified through a formal IPRC meeting/ students with existing IEPs
- Students in the process of psychoeducational assessment/ testing and/or being formally identified
- Students placed in one of our partially integrated community classes



What levels of support do we offer?

Mainstream Placement

- Indirect Service
- Resource Assistance
- Withdrawal Assistance

Partially Integrated Community Class

Community Classes

(non-credit, partially creditbearing)

- Intensive
- ASD
- Comprehensive
- Multiple Exceptionality
- Autism

Placement by referral only and assigned centrally



Description of Levels of Support

Placement	Support from Special Education Resource Teacher (SERT)
Indirect	Student meets with assigned SERT, once per semester or as needed, to assist with strategies for success
Resource	Student has access to a SERT, once per week or as needed, to assist with strategies for success
Withdrawal	Assigned SERT teaches the student's Learning Strategies course one semester, the other semester the student has access to a SERT, once per week or as needed, to assist with strategies for success
Partially Integrated	Assigned SERT teaches the student at least 50% of the day. The focus in these classes is to build skills for success in the classroom and in their postsecondary pathway



Role of Special Education Resource Teacher (SERT)

ALL students identified through the IPRC process are assigned a SERT

- Create the IEP and communicate information to parents, students, subject teachers
- Monitor students in all classes to help ensure they are being successful
- Guide students in understanding their identifications and ways in which they learn best
- Help students communicate with all their teachers and teach them how to advocate
- Support with pathway planning and course selection





What is the main DIFFERENCE between elementary and secondary school "withdrawal" support?

ELEMENTARY SCHOOL:

- Withdrawn from their Math and/or Language class(es);
- Working with a small group and SERT in a different classroom
- Usually working on modified and/or different grade level curriculum expectations in the withdrawal setting with the SERT

SECONDARY SCHOOL:

- take the Learning Strategies Course (GLE101)
- NOT be taken out of their English or Math class to work on different curriculum expectations
- Choose the appropriate course type to meet their academic needs (no modified expectations)





Learning Strategies Course – GLE 101

- **1.0 credit course** for students with an Individual Education Plan (IEP)
- Maximum 16 students in the class
- Typically offered in the first semester

Goals of the course:

- Students will learn techniques and strategies to help them be successful in ALL of their courses
- Focuses on time management, organization, advocacy skills, study skills, pathway planning, and career exploration
- Students will understand their strengths and needs and what accommodations they need to be successful

Learning Strategies is NOT a homework period!





French Courses

- French is a compulsory subject, mandatory from Grades 4 to 9 and is required for graduation
- Grade 9 French is now offered at the open level (FSF1O1) for students who are new or have less than 600 hours of instruction in French
- No French Exemptions/Substitutions
- There are a few extenuating circumstances, but the exemption must be done at the elementary level
